Context, Objectives & Methodology



Context, Objectives & Methodology

Léger was commissioned by *Fondation Émergence* to poll Canadian public opinion and perceptions of homophobia and transphobia.

Methodology

This study was conducted online from April 27 to April 30, 2015 with a random sample of 1,517 Canadians from *LegerWeb*'s panel. All respondents were 18 years of age and older and could speak French or English.

Using the latest census data from Statistics Canada, the results were weighted according to gender, age, region, mother tongue, children in the household, and level of education in order to obtain a sample representative of the entire adult population in Canada.

Note to Reader

- Since data presented in tables has been rounded up, column totals might differ from 100%.
- In graphics and tables presented, data in bold green indicate a significantly higher proportion than that of other respondents. Inversely, data in bold red indicate a proportion significantly lower than that of other respondents.
- In graphics and tables presented, green and red arrows ($\uparrow \downarrow \downarrow$) indicate statistically significant variations in comparison with the last similar measure taken, i.e., in May 2013.

1. Knowledge of the Terms: *LGBT*, *Transphobia* and *Homophobia*




Knowledge of Certain Acronyms or Words Related to Sexual Orientation

- In 2015, the vast majority of Canadians (89%; identical to 2013) said they knew the meaning of the word homophobia.
- Even though the meaning of the <u>LGBT</u> acronym and the word <u>transphobia</u> are not as well known, over the past two years, there has been a significant improvement in the knowledge of what these terms mean.
 - ➤ In fact, compared to 2013, more Canadians are aware of what the <u>LGBT</u> acronym means (61%, higher 40% in 2013) and the word transphobia (56%, higher than 40% in 2013).
- It is worth noting that compared to residents in the rest of Canada, Quebecers are more likely to say they know what the word homophobia means, but are much less informed about the LGBT acronym and the word transphobia.

- Residents of Ontario (69%) and British Columbia (69%)
- Men (64%)
- 25-34 year olds (71%)
- Anglophones (71%)
- Respondents with a gross annual household income of \$80K to \$99K (69%) and \$100K or more (80%)
- Professionals (75%)
- Respondents with a university level education (77%)
- Cisgender people (63%)
- Homosexual people (95%)

- Residents of Ontario (61%) and British Columbia (63%)
- Men (59%)
- 18-24 year olds (66%) and 25-34 year olds (68%)
- Anglophones (63%)
- Respondents with a gross annual household income of \$100K or more (68%)
- Professionals (67%) and students (71%)
- Respondents with a university level education (66%)
- Cisgender people (58%)
- Homosexual people (87%)

The proportion of respondents who know the meaning of the word Homophobia is significantly higher among:

- Residents of Québec (94%) and British Columbia (94%)
- Francophones (93%)
- People who don't have any children (91%)
- Respondents with a gross annual household income of \$80K to \$99K (95%) and \$100K or more (98%)
- Professionals (95%)
- Respondents with a university level education (93%)
- Cisgender people (92%)
- Heterosexual people (90%) and homosexual people (100%)





2. Level of Comfort with Openly Supporting LGBT People




Level of Comfort with Openly Supporting LGBT People: Immediate Circle vs. Workplace

- Overall, Canadians believe that it is easier (very + somewhat easy) for a heterosexual person to be open about their support of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people in their immediate circle (68%) than at the workplace (56%).
 - > Compared to residents in the rest of Canada, Quebecers are more likely to consider that this type of support is easy to provide, regardless of your environment.




Level of Comfort with Openly Supporting LGBT People: In Your Immediate Circle

- In total, two-thirds (68%) of Canadians consider that it is easy (very + somewhat easy) to be open about their support of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people in their immediate circle; 31% consider this to be very easy.
 - > This proportion is significantly higher among Quebecers (76%) than among residents in the rest of Canada (66%).

The proportion of respondents who consider it <u>very easy</u> for heterosexual people to be open about their support of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people in their immediate circle is significantly higher among:


- Residents of Québec (64%) and British Columbia (64%)
- Respondents with a gross annual household income of \$100K or more (42%)
- Professionals (37%)
- Respondents with a university level education (35%)
- Cisgender people (33%)



Level of Comfort with Openly Supporting LGBT People: At the Workplace

- Overall, more than half (56%) of Canadians consider it easy (very + somewhat easy), for heterosexual people to be open about their support of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people at the workplace; 22% consider this to be very easy.
 - > This proportion is significantly higher among Quebecers (64%) than among residents in the rest of Canada (54%).

The proportion of respondents who consider it <u>very easy</u> for heterosexual people to be open about their support of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people at the workplace is significantly higher among:

- Residents of Québec (64%) and British Columbia (64%)
- Respondents with a gross annual household income of \$100K or more (31%)
- People who work in services / sales / offices (29%) and professionals (27%)
- Respondents with a university level education (25%)
- Cisgender people (23%)






3. Disparaging Remarks and Disrespectful Behaviour towards LGBT People: Prevalence and Reactions



Disparaging Remarks and Disrespectful Behaviour towards LGBT People: Prevalence and Reactions

- In total, the majority of Canadians surveyed said they had witnessed disparaging remarks (jokes, nicknames, puns, insults, etc.) or disrespectful behaviour towards lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people in everyday life (72%) or on the Internet (63%).
- Nearly two-thirds (65%) of witnesses said they intervened when this happens in everyday life, but fewer than half (44%) said they intervened on the Internet.
 - ➤ Compared to residents in the rest of Canada, Quebecers are more likely to say they have witnessed disparaging remarks (jokes, nicknames, puns, insults, etc.) or disrespectful behaviour towards lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people in everyday life and have rebuked the guilty party.


Disparaging Remarks and Disrespectful Behaviour towards LGBT People: In Everyday Life

- Globally, two-thirds (65%) of Canadians who have witnessed disparaging remarks and disrespectful behaviour towards lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people in everyday life said they had reproached the guilty party; 15% asserted they did so often.
 - > This proportion is significantly higher among Quebecers (71%) than among residents in the rest of Canada (63%).

The proportion of respondents who often reproach someone for making disparaging remarks or engaging in disrespectful behaviour towards LGBT people in everyday life is significantly higher among:

- Women (21%)
- 18-24 year olds (29%)
- Students (29%)
- Homosexual people (27%) and bisexual people (38%)

The proportion of respondents who <u>occasionally</u> reproach someone for making disparaging remarks or engaging in disrespectful behaviour towards LGBT people in everyday life is significantly higher among:

- Francophones (58%)
- Respondents with a gross annual household income of \$100K or more (57%)
- Professionals (56%)
- Respondents with a university level education (55%)
- Heterosexual people (51%) and cisgender people (51%)

The proportion of respondents who <u>never</u> reproach someone for making disparaging remarks or engaging in disrespectful behaviour towards LGBT people in everyday life is significantly higher among:

- Residents of Ontario (34%)
- Men (34%)
- Retirees (37%)
- Heterosexual people (32%)




Disparaging Remarks and Disrespectful Behaviour towards LGBT People: On the Internet

- In total, at least half (44%) of Canadians who have witnessed disparaging remarks and disrespectful behaviour towards lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people on the Internet, said they had reproached the guilty party; 13% asserted they did so often.
- It should be noted that half (52%) of Canadians who have witnessed this type of situation before said they never rebuked the guilty party.

The proportion of respondents who <u>often</u> reproach someone for making disparaging remarks or engaging in disrespectful behaviour towards LGBT people on the Internet is significantly higher among:

- Residents of British Columbia (21%)
- 18-24 year olds (24%)
- Anglophones (16%)
- Parents of children (17%)
- Homosexual people (29%) and bisexual people (40%)

The proportion of respondents who <u>occasionally</u> reproach someone for making disparaging remarks or engaging in disrespectful behaviour towards LGBT people on the Internet is significantly higher among:

- Residents of Québec (37%)
- 25-34 year olds (38%) and 35-44 year olds (38%)
- Manual workers (46%)
- Cisgender people (32%)

The proportion of respondents who <u>never</u> reproach someone for making disparaging remarks or engaging in disrespectful behaviour towards LGBT people on the <u>Internet</u> is significantly higher among:

- 55-64 year olds (62%) and those 65 and over (69%)
- Retirees (67%)
- Heterosexual people (56%)






Profile of Respondents




Gender Identity
